would have been better off if she had not entered the war. He said many of his friends held similar views, but they had to do what they were told. He did not know what the Officers thought.

PN was not a member of any political party. He was only a farm labourer and too young to take part in political activities for which one must be 25 or over. He did not know his father's political inclinations. He had no idea how far JAPAN meant to go on with the war.

Was that the CHIMA War would be a short one. Now there is general disgust at its length and PW himself had no idea when it would ond. He thought that JAPAN should have been satisfied with what she gained in MANCHUMO and MERH.CHIMA and should not have attacked SOUTH CHIMA. He thought the non instrumental in bringing about the CHIMA war and later on the Pasific War were TOJO and TERAUCHI. The KONOIS cabinet did not rayour it. He thought the many has a mistake.

IW did not know what assistance JAPAN was receiving from the IIIS powers and he had not seen anything tangille.

PW thought the change in Angle/Japanese relations was due not so much to the assistance England was giving CHIMA via the Duran Road, which was mostly newspaper propagands, but to the commercial rivalry existing between the two countries.

PW had not given any thought to the fact that increase production of arms was far superior to JAPAN's, but insisted that no Japanese could entertain the idea that they night less the war.

PW stated that Chinese soldiers were much better fighters now than formerly, but they were not as strong as the soldiers he had opposed in MEM CULTRA.

PW was uncortain as to his movements after the war was over. He stated that if he returned to JAPAN he was afraid he would be killed; Jap Paw captured in CHINA in 1932, on returning to JAPAN were all killed and he supposed the same treatment would be noted out to Paw returning from this war. PW stated definitely that Paw taken by the Japanese were not killed, but that if some had been it was due to the circumstances and to the C.O. All Paw taken by the Japanese in the BUNA Area had been sent to SIRAPCER though he himself had not seen any Australian or American captives.

While training at TONKAN troops were told by Lt. BARN of MOTO Butal that if they were taken prisoner they would be either shot or 12. beyoneted to death by the enemy.

In place of a ponsion a lumpsum of money, the amount depending on length of service, was now granted to relatives of a Jap posted "missing". If later it was discovered that he was a PW this would not affect his family from a monetary point of view, provided the grant had already been paid.

IN stated that when a Jap become a soldier it was tantaments to throwing his life away. Life was precious but he could not help himself as he was ordered to fight and destroy and rather than become a prisoner, he should destroy himself.

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Jap troops were told that Psw were either ill-treated me shot but this he now know was not true for he had been very well treated with

Fi had no idoa how many soldiers there were in Japan, but thought that about 6 million were under arms.

Hatives of occupied territories were treated kindly and well, but it was not so in CHINA, for the Japanese had it ingrained in them that the Chinese were an inferior race and they were so treated in the second state of the sec

To a question as to whother or not the Espacer approved of the prosent war, FW roplied that as no had approved to TOUO being Presion by supposed that the Emperor supported TOUO's actions FW was reluctant to answer questions regarding the Espacer

W stated that there was an official irry brothel in BRIANN in which two native women from NARDNORDA and six Chinese women served. Oreal processions were taken against VD.

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
