Has testified that: "About January 1942, SHINOHARA came to my house in Anigua and asked me to go with him to see some Japanese officers. He promised to give me everything I need for my baby and myself if I would stay with the Japanese officer. I told him that I would not. After that I ran away. The second time I was trying to buy meat in Agana and SHINOHARA came up to me and again asked me to go with him. He threatened to lock me up if I didn't go with him to live with the Japanese officer. He wanted me to live with this Japanese officer as man and wife. After I refused he told me that he was going to come back that night and get me. I ran away to Barrigada and stayed with my aunty so that he couldn't find me. The first time he threatened me by saying that I had to obey the Japanese rules and that I must go with him. After three months I came back to Agana from Barrigada. SHINOHARA picked me up in a car and took me to the American disbursing office which was being used by the Japanese as headquarters at the time. SHINOHARA brought me into this officer where there was a Japanese officer by the name of Awata. He started to talk with me and asked me if I could stay with the officers. While we were there, in the presence of this officer, SHINOHARA told me to pack up my things and move into a house which he had fixed up for me and the officers. After I got out again I ran away and I never saw SHINOHARA after that. He told me in the presence of Awata that I have to move into the house and lived with Awata."

(f) Witness:

Catalina Salas Matanane.

Has testified that: "Shortly after the American prisoners left for Japan, SHINOHARA came to my house in Agana and asked that I come and act as a cook for the Japanese officers who were living at Mrs. Kerner's house in Agana. He told me to go and have a physical examination for venereal disease and I did this at the hospital. SHINOHARA went to the hospital and saw that I had no venereal disease and so he took me to Mrs. Kerner's house that afternoon. He told me that if I don't come with I will be punished and locked up, after I told him I didn't want to go. When we got to Mrs. Kerner's house Grace Flores was there. Later in the afternoon SHINOHARA brought Theodora C. Soriano and Beatrice Untalan. When SHINOHARA left he locked the doors to the house so that we were unable to get out. He returned that night with the Governor and the Aide to the Governor and the third in command. He told us that we must serve them and do what they tell us. After we had served them drinks they persuaded us to go to bed with them. I went to bed with the Governor after he had tried to persuade Grace Flores to go to bed with him but she was crying and did not want to sleep with him. He was too drunk and very impudent. The following weekend the Governor returned and I slept with him Saturday and Sunday nights. During this time SHINOHARA came to the house every day and I would ask him occasionally if I could leave and he told me no, that I had to stay and that if I left I would be punished. Finally, after about a month and a half, I got to talking to the Governor and told him that I wanted to leave and go to my own house and live with my family who were living some distance away. He said that if I didn't want to live there, there is no reason why I should and if I wanted to I could leave. At one time SHINOHARA told me that I should accept no
